Archaeology and Historic Environment

This course offers an introduction to the great civilisations of the ancient world. You will learn about the archaeology of Ancient Egypt, the Mediterranean world of the Romans and Greeks, and the civilisations of Mesopotamia, the Levant and Mesoamerica, through studying key case studies of sites and monuments in the landscape.

Please note that this is one of two Archaeology Certificate courses, which typically run in alternate years. They can be studied independently of each other, and in any order. *Certificate I* provides a grounding in British archaeology, with units on 'Prehistoric peoples' and 'Historic peoples'.

This course offers an exciting interdisciplinary approach to the history of the landscape. The three units together provide an introduction to the development of the historic environment from prehistory to the modern period using a range of accessible sources – the earthworks and ecology of the landscape itself, documents, maps, archaeology and architecture – and provide you with straightforward skills to begin to decipher the landscape for yourself.

This course examines the archaeological, documentary, art and architectural evidence for the origins and development of Anglo-Saxon England between the 5th and the 11th centuries. It addresses the hotly-debated question of continuity (or lack of continuity) between Romano-British and Anglo-Saxon culture, the emergence and character of the Anglo-Saxon kingdoms, and the expression of these changes in archaeology, art and architecture. It explores the impact of the Vikings on established Anglo-Saxon culture. It also discusses the expression of cultural innovation in archaeological evidence, secular and religious buildings, and in the art of the period.

This course will appeal to anyone who wishes to gain experience in the practical, hands-on aspect of the discipline of archaeology. Over the course of the year, you will be given insight into a wide range of archaeological techniques ranging from the study of past environments to approaches for interpreting artefacts. This is coupled with excavation and survey in the final term, which will allow you to put the knowledge you have gained into context, building up a portfolio of skills. The course is open to all regardless of previous educational experience, although prior study at Certificate level is recommended.

Please note that this is one of three Archaeology Diploma courses, which typically run in alternate years. They can be studied independently of each other, and in any order.

Diploma I provides an advanced and in-depth knowledge of a key prehistoric and historic period in the archaeology of Britain, coupled with an insight into the study of bones and ancient diseases. *Diploma II* exposes students to the public face of the discipline, informed by up-to-date theory and the archaeology of conflict in the 20th century.

Architecture and Design

Undergraduate Certificate of Higher Education in Historic Building Conservation

This two-year course offers an introduction to the philosophy and practice of historic building conservation, with an emphasis on developing an understanding of the traditional crafts involved. It is taught by means of lectures, visits and field trips across East Anglia to view buildings and practitioners at work. Classes take place at Madingley Hall, a 16th-century manor house set in eight acres of landscaped gardens designed by Capability Brown, and the headquarters of the Institute of Continuing Education.

Postgraduate Certificate in Professional Practice in Architecture

This course is for graduates who have obtained RIBA/ARB Parts 1 and 2 or have confirmation of Parts 1 and 2 equivalence from the Architects' Registration Board (ARB). Successful completion of the course qualifies you to register with the ARB and thereafter be called an architect. It also entitles you to take up corporate membership of the Royal Institute of British Architects (RIBA). Thereby, it provides a formal entry route into the profession. The course acts as a forum for discussion of certain major concerns of the profession as well as providing preparation for the examination.



MSt in Building History

This academically rigorous yet practical course aims to equip you for careers in historic building investigation, research, recording, assessment, management and interpretation. The course, delivered by the Department of Architecture and devised in collaboration with English Heritage (now Historic England), is unique in combining British architectural history with practical tuition in interpreting building fabric.

MSt in Construction Engineering

The aim of this course is to develop and empower emerging leaders to transform the construction industry. It is an advanced leadership programme aimed at future leaders of the industry. The course is offered by the Department of Engineering in association with the Cambridge Judge Business School at the University of Cambridge.

MSt in Interdisciplinary Design for the Built Environment

This course is designed for early-career professionals and provides a strategic overview of the production of the built environment, including current challenges faced by the construction industry such as global climate change and sustainability. It equips professionals for strategic decision making, inventive problem solving and team

leadership. The course is delivered by the Cambridge Institute of Sustainability Leadership in association with the Departments of Architecture and Engineering.

This course is delivered by the Department of Land Economy and draws on the multi-disciplinary strength of the Department and the University. The course aims to equip you with a broader knowledge of all aspects of the real estate industry, providing insight into a range of long-term themes and strategic issues in the market as well as developing a range of research and other skills.

English Literature and Film Studies

This course offers an introduction to English Literature spanning more than 500 years, from Shakespeare to the present day. It is designed for anyone who has an enthusiasm for reading and wants to learn more about the writers and their work in relation to their period and to other writers. The course is based on the conviction that that the skill of close reading is central to the pursuit and enjoyment of literary study. It will introduce you to techniques of close reading and contextual analysis, providing a stepping stone for further study and lifelong exploration of literature.

Please note that this is one of two English Literature Certificate courses, which typically run in alternate years. They can be studied independently of each other, and in any order. *Certificate II* includes units on reading and interpretation, Romanticism, and Beckett and 20th-century drama.

History and Local History

Undergraduate Certificate in Local History I

This course will introduce you to the approaches historians take to local history, including landscape and architectural history, oral history, church history, and qualitative history (such as diaries), plus transcribing original documents. These approaches, and others, are further explored through the themes of the history of poverty, disease and medicine and the history of religious identities. You will be introduced to a wide range of primary and secondary evidence and will be given instruction in document evaluation and essay writing skills.

Please note that this is one of two Local History Certificate courses, which typically run in alternate years. They can be studied independently of each other, and in any order. *Certificate II* includes units on approaches to local history, the world of material goods 1200–1800, and crime and the social order 1500–1900.

This course offers a theoretical approach to art history and the relevant socio-cultural, historical and political contexts. It will introduce you to the most significant movements which emerged in Western Europe during the 20th century, from Cubism to Postmodernism, and their impact on painting, sculpture and architecture. On completion of the course, you will have acquired specific knowledge of the groundbreaking developments within art and of new media, from collage to digitalisation, involved in art production.

Please note that this is one of two History of Art Diploma courses, which typically run in alternate years. They can be studied independently of each other, and in any order. *Diploma I* includes units on portraiture 1500–1750, the art of the Grand Tour, and art in the industrial age.

Law and Criminology

What is knowledge? How does it differ from mere belief, or a lucky guess? Do we have minds? Can thoughts and sensations be identified with states of the brain? How should human beings be treated? When, if ever, is it permissible to deliberately harm other people? What is it to act freely, and do we ever have true freedom? This course will help you to find answers to these and other questions. You will engage with some key debates in the history of philosophy, as well as in contemporary discussions in the philosophy of mind, and you will be given the opportunity to reflect on the current socio-political trends whilst examining the pivotal developments in modern social and political philosophy.

Please note that this is one of two Philosophy Certificate courses, which typically run in alternate years. They can be studied independently of each other, and in any order. *Certificate I* includes units on metaphysics, logic and the philosophy of language, and ethics.

Social Sciences

This course will provide you with a disciplinary-based introduction to sociology, politics and psychology. You will explore research evidence and theories which attempt to explain identity construction, individual and group behaviour, and power and political relationships in modern societies. The course encourages critical thinking related to existing social scientific research and theory in order to promote balanced judgements about the causes of behaviour in modern societies.

This course will be taught over six linked weekends and will cover topics such as peace, conflict and diplomacy, and shifting global power. The course is designed for anyone who wishes to gain a better understanding of global issues affecting society today, but it will also be of particular interest to those considering ICE's MSt degree in International Relations, or those who have a professional interest in the field.
